
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My "daughter" Mavis is very special to me. She must look me up whenever she is in Kenya, and when I am in Ghana, she looks me up and insists on taking me to the airport.

Although we are going through a period of uncertainty due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we have great hope that again scientists will come to the fore and provide solutions to mankind. I wish to thank the Editor in Chief of AJFAND, the Hon. Prof Ruth Oniang'o for giving me the opportunity to share my journey with the journal from inception.

It has been almost twenty years since I met her at a conference in Harare, Zimbabwe, where she shared her passion for rural development, nutrition and the development of science in Africa. As a young scientist,

after only obtaining my PhD in 2001, this resonated well with what I perceived as the role of scientists in Africa, where we don't have to play catch-up but be at the fore-front of developments in science. The journal receives papers for publication from around the world and from a wide cross- section of researchers, for example from postgraduate students, early researchers, and well-established researchers in areas of food science, nutrition, agriculture and rural development. I have noted that the journal never misses an issue, which is an indication of the high number of good quality papers submitted to the journal. I have reviewed on average 10 papers per year and it has been a pleasure doing so. It gives me the satisfaction that this was my small contribution to science, especially in areas of food science, nutrition, and agriculture.

The quality of papers has been top level as shown by the frequency of citation of the published articles. In my area of expertise, i.e. Food Microbiology, there has been rapid









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development in the use of new technologies for research, especially molecular techniques such as whole genome sequencing, Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR), and Restricted Fragment Length Polymorphism (RFLP), which require that future reviewers at AJFAND be active in research to keep abreast with the new developments. I am confident that the journal will grow from strength to strength. I am most grateful to the team at AJFAND who have professionally supported us as reviewers and for their courtesy. I look forward to greater involvement with the Journal in the future.

Childhood overweight has become an epidemic as it is found in both developing and developed countries. Estimates showed that the number in Africa has doubled to 10.6 million from 5.4 million in 1990. Childhood overweight places a significant challenge on the physical, psychological, social health which includes bullying in schools. This calls for urgent diverse strategies to address this burden. Parents are role models and play a very important part in changing children's health positively.

When my manuscript was published by AJFAND in 2017, I was confident that I had written a good


